Hooded plover



Who am I?

I am a shy little bird who lives on sandy ocean beaches, and you can call me a "hoodie" – it's my nickname!

I have a black 'hood', white collar, black-tipped red beak, and red rings around my eyes, and my chicks are sandy-brown all over to help them camouflage from predators. You might see me scurrying about the beach, bobbing my head, and snacking on insects, worms, and sandhoppers.

We pair up for life and between August and March every year, we make a nest in shallow sand and washed-up seaweed. We take turns incubating 1-3 speckled eggs for about 30 days before they hatch, and my chicks are vulnerable for another 35 days until they can fly.

How can you help me?


Over summer, I live on the beach so when you come to visit for a walk or swim, remember to look out for me and my nest and give us plenty of space! I'm easily startled, so if you get too close, I might leave my nest and expose my eggs to the sun. My eggs and chicks are also small, fragile, and blend in with the sand to protect them from predators. To help keep us safe, please keep your distance, and make sure your dog is on a lead.
